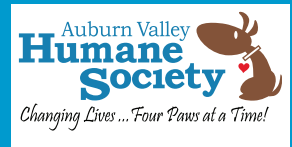

The fall season is upon us and once again summer seems to have passed us by. This is a special time of year when the temperatures lower, the days get shorter and the need for four legged companionship may be just what one needs for the long winter months ahead. It is also a time we reflect on the things in our lives for which we are thankful.

Usually, one is thankful for good health and the love of family and friends. I have always been thankful for all of those things, but there is also one thing I am sincerely thankful for. It is the love and companionship I receive from the animals in my life. The human animal bond is something I have truly grown to appreciate over the years. The comfort, enjoyment and amusement I receive from the animals in my life truly completes me. I can say I would not be the person I am today if the animals in my life had not influenced me to be the human they expected.

I recently lost a dog who had been in my life for the past 8 years. Her name was Brindle. She was a 100+ pound Fila Mastiff who had been in 6 homes in a period of 5 days before she arrived at the shelter where I worked. Brindle was scared, aggressive to other animals and most people, and she was completely incorrigible with absolutely no manners. She was also on the euthanasia list with less than a day to go. Our family was not looking to add a new dog into our house, but Brindle needed us. Initially we fostered her with the intention of getting Brindle out of the kennel and finding her a forever home. What we soon found out was how much

we needed her and how much she would teach us.

Brindle became part of our family almost instantly. She also learned where she fit in the hierarchy of the other animals in our house. Because Brindle's head was above counter height, any food left out in the kitchen, was fair game. Admittedly throughout the time she spent with us, we did have some issues with her trying to kill the neighbors and any delivery person who would attempt to enter her space (that is why all of our packages are always left at the top of the driveway). But in her pea brained mind, Brindle was protecting us from the bad people in the world. This was my explanation to the sheriff when he would come by to tell me that my dog had scared a neighbor or postman. Because of Brindle, I never felt the need to lock a door in the house or have an uneasy feeling when leaving my family home alone. When we went camping, we didn't need a gun, as Brindle stood guard all night and would with chase off the bears that came into our camp with purpose and excitement.

We stood by Brindle through thick and thin. Many people would have given up on her because of her behavior issues. I see dogs come into the shelter every day for far less. We were committed to her and because of that, Brindle was committed to us. We were thankful to have her in our lives and we lovingly overlooked and adjusted to her misgivings because that is what family does and she was a part of our family.

Because we continued to give her the opportunity to grow with us, she taught us over the years the meaning of loyalty and how important it is to protect those you love at any cost. Brindle also taught us patience, forgiveness and that we must be accountable for not only our actions but of those around us as well. In addition, she taught me

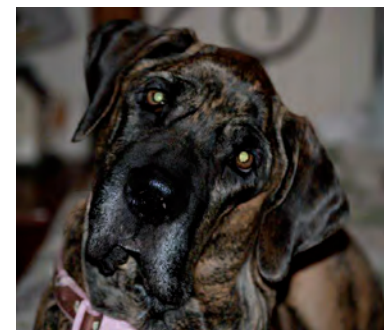
that a short nap in the afternoon is a good thing and that I must chase the deer out of the front yard at every opportunity.

October is **Adopt a Shelter Dog Month**. I think it is a little soon for our family to consider a new shelter dog, but it is the perfect time to find a special friend to curl up next to on those cold winter evenings. Be it a dog or a cat, pets are always 100% faithful and their unconditional love will keep them by your side through the good and bad times.

By adopting a dog or a cat, you will be enhancing your life as well as the life of a shelter animal. Adopting has shown to be beneficial to your health and well-being, and may be one of the best things that you do in your life. I know it was in mine.

When visiting our shelter or viewing our adoptable animals online, our staff is readily available to assist with questions and will work closely with you to find the right companion to fit your lifestyle.

Brindle, even though you have gone, you will always be a part of us...thank you for all the joy you gave us... we will miss you!

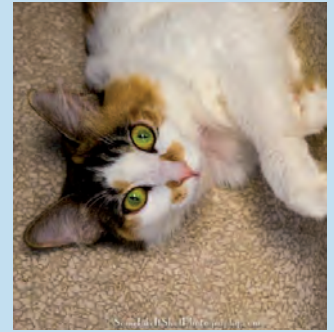

What's Up Doc?

Five Reasons to be Thankful for your Furry Friend!

1. **Pets Love Us Unconditionally.** It doesn't matter if we've got morning breath, received bad grades or missed a major benchmark at the office... our pets are always there for us. There is no limit on the love and affection they send our way when greeting us like an A-list celebrity.

2. **Pets Are The BEST Snuggle Buddies.** Winter on the way? No problem, our furry friends are little heaters with four legs and always ready to cozy on the couch. Best of all, they don't judge you when you're binge watching Netflix, again!

3. **They Make Us Laugh.** Think about it! How many times have you laughed out loud at your pet's silly antics? They can do some pretty hilarious things that keep us entertained.

4. **Pets Are Good For Our Health.** Having a pet can lead to lower blood pressure and a healthier heart through their ability to relieve stress and improve mood. Studies show that animal-assisted therapies such as visitation programs for nursing home residents can help decrease anxiety and help overcome loneliness and depression.

5. **They Help Us Exercise.** Walking is one of the best health activities you can do. Getting your dog to the dog park, for a walk around the block, or a jog down a trail is excellent exercise for everyone involved. The Centers for Disease Control list decreased blood pressure, cholesterol and triglyceride levels as additional health benefits of owning pets.

GETTING YOUR NEW PET SETTLED

As you bring your new furry friend home this season, here are some things to keep in mind in making sure everyone settles in successfully...

Expect mistakes & behavior problems. What!?! You've just adopted the most perfect pet, right? Yes, but your pet may have had a different set of rules in their previous home, or even no rules at all. Expect that there will be an adaptation period where everyone settles into the routine.

Be kind. When you first bring your pet home, realize they may have come off the streets, been previously injured, or housed in the nice but noisy shelter and now are in your cozy home. Be patient with them as they acclimate to your loving but unfamiliar place with strangers. Being gentle, considerate, kind and patient go a long way to easing this transition.

Watch out and go extra slow for pets that are scared or anxious. If your new pet appears scared provide them with a small quiet area with food and a litter box (if a cat). Do not allow children to bother a frightened pet; fear can result in bites and scratches from a pet that would not normally act that way. Read your pet's signals and don't pick them up or hold them if it's not on their terms. Respect their space as they settle.

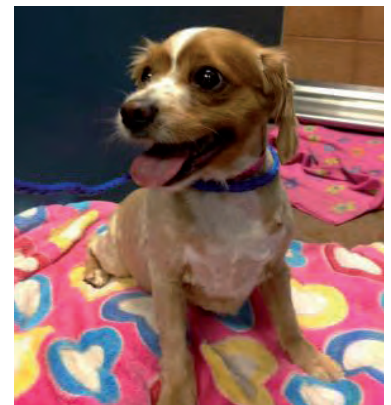
How long should this take? Some outgoing pets may settle in over a few days, while other more shy pets may take several weeks. Adopting a pet is a lifetime commitment. Making a patient and concerted effort to achieve a successful adoption will pay off in the long run for everyone involved.

Furr Report

Hidden Cat Dangers

When it comes to the holidays, there are so many things to be careful about: not gaining 10 pounds; not getting yourself into debt buying presents; and of course keeping your cats healthy, happy and safe.

Homes become pet playgrounds this time of year. Cats delight in un-decking the halls. Here are some tips to help keep them holly, jolly and oh-so-safe!

- Ribbon and tinsel can send your cat to the emergency room when ingested.

- Kitties love the sparkly, light catching "toy" but a nibble on the light can lead to swallowing which can cause severe vomiting

and dehydration and even possibly surgery. Light strands can cause severe burns or electrocution when chewed. Keep dangerous decorations up and away or locked in a room away from your cats.

- Plants like holly, mistletoe and poinsettias can cause nausea, vomiting and diarrhea when ingested. Plants that are silk or plastic can deliver an equally showy statement without the risk of upset stomach.

- Be sure to securely anchor your tree. This can prevent the tree from tipping, falling and avoiding cat injury and chaos. If you have a live tree you want be sure your pets are not drinking the stagnant water.

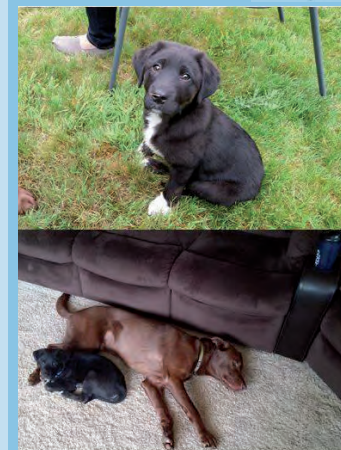
- Give your cat a safe and quiet place where your cat can get away from all the festivities.

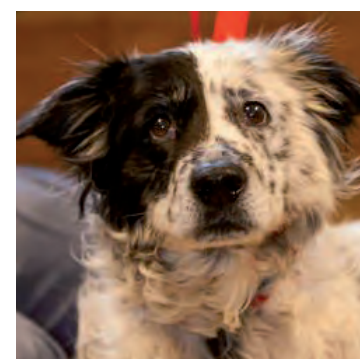
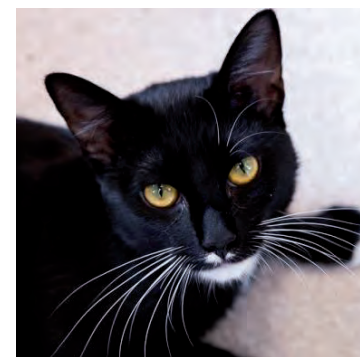
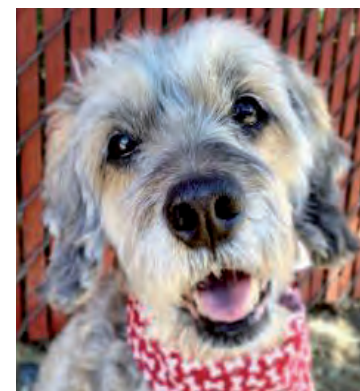
Needs forever home!

AVHS Pet Pantry

The AVHS Pet Pantry has been active since January 2015 and doing well! With a partnership with Seattle Humane Society, AVHS has been able to distribute pet food to over 25 low-income senior citizens each month at the AVHS Thrift Store & More. Each recipient is eligible to apply for food for 3 pets. We are providing cat and dog food for approximately 75 pets per month on top of our own shelter animals!

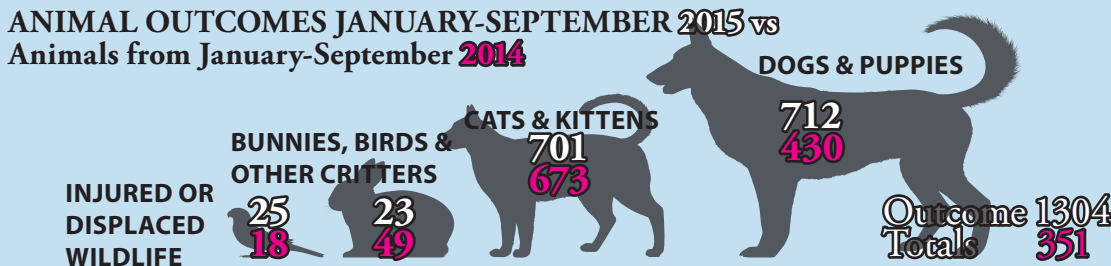

The Auburn Valley Humane Society is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization who partners with the City of Auburn for the housing of the lost and stray animals within the city limits of Auburn. The AVHS shelter opened on January 1, 2013. AVHS serves King and Pierce Counties for pet adoptions and owners looking to re-home their beloved pets.

No adoptable animals have been euthanized in the first two and half years of operation!

She also chews on parts of house and furniture which we are working on. Initially she was slightly over weight due to inactivity, but now her weight is perfect. We have our nightly ritual of brushing teeth and brushing her beautiful red hair while singing 'Baby Mine' (from Dumbo). She backs up when she sees the tooth brush but when I start singing 'Baby Mine' her eyes start to become mellow and sleepy. It is really cute when she does that.

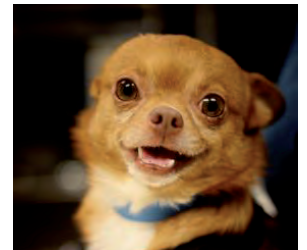

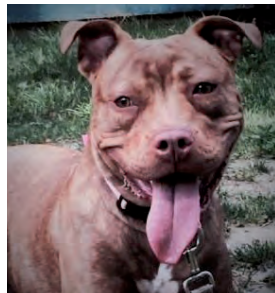

Muffin, a 7 month old Pit Bull Terrier Mix, who was

lost and roaming the streets, was brought to the Auburn Valley Humane Society by a good Samaritan. Muffin said: My knee cap would dislocate when I walked and played too much. An orthopedic specialty surgeon recommended surgery. They said it was going to cost \$2,634 plus a little extra for meds and supplies. I had my surgery and I couldn't wait to be able to play without pain and live a full and happy life!

Muffin was adopted in mid-October to a wonderful loving home. Muffin thanks everyone with lots of slobbery kisses for their

kindness. The animals which come through our doors are depending on your goodwill. Giving in itself is an act of unconditional love. Giving to animal welfare is one of the purest acts of charity, as you provide for the most vulnerable members of our community. Will you please join us today?
